Celebrating the final weeks of 2020

Sue and Carl Swensson kindly offered to host last Sunday's event. A couple of dozen attended and around half that number made their apologies. Sue welcomed everybody, Bill Southwood made an acknowledgement of country and threw the floor open to steering group members.

Roz Bannon on the steering group

Members of the group gave a brief report back on the year and the outlook for 2021. The steering group has met fairly informally as required. Since being awarded the BVSC Environmental grant, much of the work has concentrated on clearing weeds, reducing fire load, training members in Landcare practices, acquiring and planting indigenous species.

Peter Campbell on grants

Having missed out on the WIRES grant, du largely to inexperience and the very limited time we had, we were delighted to be awarded a BVSC Environmental grant. This is being used to buy a range of material - plants, guards, a first aid kit, training. The biggest single expenditure has been the mulching of some massive weed trees, more of which below. We still have around \$1500 of the grant yet to spend and intend to do so over the next few months.

Doug Mein on bushfire mitigation

The Bermagui Regional Fire Brigade visited the Wallaga Lake littoral earlier in the year, agreed that felling some dead treed and getting fallen logs onto the ground would be useful. A recommendation to undertake this work was made to RFS Bega. It is now unanimously agreed that this summer's fire risk will be very much lower than last summer, but vigilance and reduction of hazards will continue.

Heights Care members attended two workshops run by The Crossing for communities on the fire edge. We attended with Beauty Point and there was considerable discussion about long effects the fires have had on even relatively unaffected communities. Reports on the workshops and a usefulness of fire-resistant plants is accessible from the Crossing's Facebook page. The Crossing will make these available as filed shorthy.

U3A sponsored three public talks by Bruce Leaver, a person with extensive experienced in analysing fire behaviour. The slides from Bruce's talk are well worth a look, and are available online at:

Libby Bolton on Landcare activities beside Wallaga Lake

As mentioned in past newsletters, around a dozen Heights Care members have joined the Far South Coast Landcare Association (FSCLA), been through the induction including values, practices and risks. The Landcare work under way includes:

- Removing Ipomea, Elephant Grass, Prickly Pear, Turkey Rhubarb, Lantana and on and on and on forever;
- This makes way for the really exciting stuff planting indigenous grasses, ground cover and low plants, including Lomandra, Westringia, Pigface, Warrigal, Myoporum the list goes on;
- Last Friday 4 December the excellent work done by group members in cutting down an enormous growth of
 Tecoma a pernicious weed species was finished off by a mechanical mulcher retained under the grant.
 This turned the Tecoma and an equally pernicious Cotoneaster into a small mountain of useful mulch.
 Combined with larger pieces of trunk it will be used to stabilise the bank and provide a platform for planting more natives;
- And breaking news many months after a WIRES-approved and critter-friendly nesting box was baited with apple and mounted in the trees by the lake, a family of ring-tailed possums has taken up residence.

There will always be masses of work still to do, but it's not a bad start! All help welcome.
