<p>Eastern Grey Kangaroo <i>Macropus giganteus</i></p> <p>Small number drinking from rivulet and evidence of them feeding on grassed areas. They are using the path to move around the lake edge</p>		X		
<p>Swamp Wallaby <i>Wallabia bicolor</i></p> <p>2 seen on site and evidence of them using the foreshore. Suspect they are the ones nibbling the Viminaria (Golden Showers) that we planted.</p>		X		
<p>Echidna <i>Tachyglossus aculeatus</i></p> <p>One seen during summer, but the area is very wet over Autumn and not many ants. One wandered around whole reserve in September 2022</p>				X





<p>Long Nose Bandicoot <i>Perameles nasuta</i></p> <p>Autumn 22...Have seen holes and poo in the mown areas across all of site and diggings in patches of mulch in gardens. Probably living under fallen logs on bank. Female with pouch young seen September 2022.</p>		X		
<p>Brush Tail Possum <i>Trichosurus vulpecula</i></p> <p>Brushies are probably feeding in gardens more than in the Reserve. A big old male was looking very sick and another was killed on the highway. Have a male and female on site.</p>		X		
<p>Ring Tail Possum <i>Pseudocheirus peregrinus</i></p> <p>Evidence of ringtails in the banksias to the north and seen in the large gum.</p>		X		







<p>Dusky Antechinus</p> <p>One trapped in water bucket (alive) Several seen on reserve over summer 2023</p>		X		
<p>Grey Headed Flying Fox <i>Pteropus poliocephalus</i></p> <p>There was a camp in the she oak swamp north of the site in early Autumn. GHFF seen flying over and feeding in the Banksias. Not as many banksias flowering on the headland, but the Spotted gums are doing a massive flowering across the whole SE Coast, May 2022. None during summer 2023</p>		X		
<p>Lesser Long ear Bat <i>Nyctophilus geoffroyii</i></p> <p>This species was previously seen by a wildlife carer Photo from Montreal BioBlitz. Lesser Long Ear on left and Goulds on right.</p>		X		X

<p>Swamp Rat - <i>Rattus lutreolus</i></p> <p>These have been digging burrows amongst the Juncus and Ficinia on the Foreshore area and then coming up to feed on Reserve. They would have had to move to higher ground during the storms. Numbers have decreased due to feral cat. Sept 2022 Young seen in northern area of reserve over summer 2023.</p>		X

<p>Rabbit <i>Oryctolagus cuniculus</i></p> <p>Rabbits are across the whole site.</p>		X		
<p>Fox <i>Vulpes vulpes</i></p> <p>Heard a fox going through Reserve one night and found dead one on edge of lake, possibly hit by car and later died.</p>		X		
<p>Feral Cat</p> <p>Evidence of a cat was seen in the form of part carcasses of rabbits under car and bird feathers on the walking track. Spring and the swamp rat, bush rat and feral rat populations have plummeted, possibly due to predation.</p>		X		

<p>Rat <i>Rattus rattus</i></p> <p>Rats are a lot smaller in this area, body length of 200 mm which is same as Bush Rats that have shorter tails. Not many around over Summer 2023 = could have been eaten by cat.</p>			X		
<p>House Mouse <i>Mus musculus</i></p> <p>These are probably spread right across the site as there are houses and lots of hiding places.</p>			X		
<p>Tiger Snake <i>Notechis scutatus</i></p> <p>Dead specimen at the northern end of site. Has white underside the whole length of body and tail with no stripes on top.</p>			X		
<p>Red Bellied Black Snake <i>Pseudechis porphyriocus</i></p> <p>RBBS have been seen sunning on the east facing bank in the mornings and hunting throughout the whole area. Only 1 seen during summer 2023</p>			X		



<p>White lipped Snake</p> <p>Unfortunately this specimen was killed by a kookaburra or like and body discarded, found dead on track.</p>			X		
<p>Water skink <i>Eulamprus quoyii</i></p> <p>There was an abundance of lizards this year which probably accounted for the return of the Kookaburras</p>			X		
<p>Garden Skink <i>Lampropholis delicata/guichenoti</i></p> <p>A good breeding year for these little lizards with many in the leaf litter.</p>			X		
<p>Lace Monitor <i>Varanus varius</i></p> <p>The monitor was seen in the Reserve during January 2021 and again 2023</p>					X
<p>Gecko</p>	<p>Haven't seen one, but scats on wall of house.</p>			X	

<p>Blue Tongue Lizard  Tiliqua sp  Unfortunately one was run over on road Jan 2023</p>				X
<p>Perons Tree Frog</p>	<p>These have been heard calling after rain.</p>		X	
<p>Spotted Marsh Frog  Limnodynastes tasmaniensis  With the wet summer and autumn the frog numbers are high. They bury in dirt over winter and are often dug up in gardens.</p>		X
